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### **Outside Your Museum: The Flowing Waters of Manuels River**

The flowing waters of Manuels River, carry many memories. From the earliest settlers to those of today, precious moments continue to be made along its rocky river beds. Many of these stories have been recorded, while others continue to be explored and observed. Notions of Treasure was a popular idea that captured the minds of many. From Pirates to buried treasure there was a lure of mystery and intrigue that surrounded the shores and rivers of Conception Bay's Southshore.

"Pirates, treachery, buried treasures ... sounds like something out of a Peter Pan movie. But Conception Bay may have once been the scene for such fantasy. According to some of the other members of our community, it was common to hear about pirates digging for gold on Bell Island and Kelly's Island. They were also spotted digging on Manuels Head at the mouth of Manuels River where they dug up more bones than gold." (Told by Mr. William Chisholm, Manuels, from the Manuels River Natural Heritage Society\* Heritage Survey.) This possibility of treasure captivated nearby and local communities, influencing independent treasure hunters to seek their wealth and fortune. But as was popular in Newfoundland weaves, the treasure wasn't always silver and gold. In one tale, reiterated by Sandra Smith of Manuels, the sought-out treasure was of a more mental and spiritual nature:

"In my grandfather's time, there was an immensely sized rock in the clearing of the woods on Manuels Head. It was "Flat as flat as a pancake" on one end, a big bump like the "Rear end of a pig" on the other, and it was as white as the driven snow. If you go out there all alone at midnight around St. Georges day, sit on the hump of the rock with your feet on the flat part and concentrate real hard on the treasure as the same time looking out to where the sea and sky meet, you walk away a richer and wiser man." (MUN Folklore Archives, Survey 71,81,03)

While these two stories appear more of a fantastical exaggeration, gold in the form of mineral deposits has been rumored to exist somewhere along the river. With various geological and architectural surveys being done over the course of the town's development, speculations of gold deposits are believed to lie right under the foundations of the local ice cream hotspot called "Bergs."

But whether these stories of stolen treasure and gold prove true or false, the mystery and majesty of the river add to the grand views found along its highest peak. Bringing magic and richness to the many memories that continue to take place there.

### New Online Exhibit on the Tragic Sinking of the S.S. Caribou Ferry in 1942

During the Second World War, dozens of merchant ships and Canadian warships were torpedoed and sunk by German Uboats off the Atlantic coast of Newfoundland and Canada. The sinking with the greatest loss of life was the ferry S.S. Caribou, which connected Port aux Basques, Newfoundland and North Sydney, Nova Scotia. Last April, the Shipwreck Preservation Society of Newfoundland & Labrador (SPSNL) and the South West Coast Historical Society were excited to launch a new virtual museum exhibit entitled The Tragic Sinking of S.S. Caribou. The exhibit tells the story of how a German U-boat attacked the ferry in the middle of the night, killing 137 passengers and crew.

To create the exhibit, we gathered documents, maps, photographs and audio tapes from archives and museums in Newfoundland, Canada, Britain, and Germany. They revealed new details about the U-boat attack and the subsequent rescue of survivors. We used audio interviews to share the experiences of crewmen and passengers aboard the Caribou as the ship was hit by the torpedo. We shot video interviews to tell family stories of how residents in Channel-Port aux Basques were affected by the tragedy. We included photographs of artifacts from the ship that are now displayed in museums and homes in Channel-Port aux Basques and St. John's. We highlighted the commemorative ceremonies held at the Caribou Memorial in Channel-Port aux Basques to remember the fallen.

The exhibit tells the stories of how the sinking on October 14, 1942 impacted the Caribou's crew, as well as the servicemen, women and civilian passengers aboard the doomed ferry. The communities affected by the loss of loved ones stretched right across Newfoundland, Canada and the United States. The sinking of the S.S. Caribou had a profound impact on the governments and people of Newfoundland and Canada by bringing the war right to their doorsteps. We hope the exhibit lets more people appreciate the wartime service and sacrifice of those who lost their lives in the sinking.

This virtual museum exhibit was made possible with generous support from Digital Museums Canada with additional funding from the CEDP-Heritage program of the NL Department of Tourism, Culture, Arts and Recreation.

### The Conception Bay Museum Launches Its First Virtual Exhibit

The Conception Bay Museum has launched its first virtual exhibit with the support of the Digital Museums Canada investment program. Titled "Alone Among the Stars: Aviation in Harbour Grace, NL (1919 - Present)," this virtual exhibit details the community's long, exciting history of aviation through archival records, oral histories, and artifacts.

The story begins in 1919, when the town played host to the Handley Page "Atlantic," a former World War I bomber whose pilot, Admiral Sir Mark Kerr, sought to compete in the Great Atlantic Air Race.

In 1927, local labourers constructed Newfoundland's first permanent airstrip at Harbour Grace to facilitate the around-the-world flight attempt of the Pride of Detroit. This site subsequently hosted twenty transatlantic flight attempts over a nine-year period. Famously, Amelia Earhart utilized the airstrip on her solo transatlantic flight from Harbour Grace to Londonderry, Northern Ireland, on May 20, 1932.

While Earhart's flight remains the airstrip's most famous, the virtual exhibit shines a light on lesser-known aviators and their aspirations to "challenge the Atlantic." According to chairperson Patrick J. Collins, the desire to further highlight these lesser-known stories came from the Museum's revamping of its physical Aviation Room exhibit in 2022:

"Our physical exhibit space offers visitors a wonderful chance to learn about Harbour Grace's most famous aviators," says Collins. "But the whole story couldn't possibly be contained in that room. We started chatting about avenues to tell a fuller picture of our aviation history, and we decided that a virtual exhibit would be ideal. Also, the virtual platform would allow us to showcase both the Museum and community to a national and international audience. The two exhibits pair nicely and hopefully spark visitors' curiosity."

To craft this virtual exhibit, the Museum received funding from the Digital Museums Canada investment program. Digital Museums Canada helps build digital capacity in Canadian museums, heritage, cultural, and indigenous organizations, and gives Canadians unique access to diverse stories and experiences. Digital Museums Canada is managed by the Canadian Museum of History, with the financial support of the Government of Canada.

The virtual exhibit also relates the contributions of locals to the airstrip's enduring legacy, such as the Archibald and Parsons families. Notably, the Archibalds were highly involved in the maintenance and administration of the site during the heyday of transatlantic endeavour. Local Bill Parsons catalogued activities at the airstrip during his time as a stringer for the Associated Press. He later coauthored a book on the airstrip, The Challenge of the Atlantic (1983), with journalist Bill Bowman. Today, the historic airstrip remains in use, with the local branch of the Canadian Owners and Pilots Association (COPA), Flight 97, organizing regular maintenance.

### News from the White Elephant Museum, Makkovik

2023 marks the fiftieth year for the Makkovik Fish Plant. The White Elephant Museum marked this milestone by holding an open house during the town's annual Trout Festival in August. With help from our summer student, Ryden Andersen, a display about the fish plant was created. It consisted of some "fast facts" posted on the walls; a binder of newspaper and other clippings; a slideshow; video (showed workers bringing wooden boxes of iced-in salmon from the longliner to the plant); plus a video of a class visit to the turbot plant about 25 years ago; and a children's matching game.

The Makkovik Fish Plant was opened in 1973, processing salmon (until the commercial fishery ended in 1998), some char, and cod (until 1990 when the cod was gone from this area). Turbot began to be processed in the 1980s. A new fish plant was constructed in 1991, a year before the cod moratorium was declared. Turbot was processed in the new plant. A crab plant was built beside it in 1998. This summer the plant processed crab first and after that fishery ended, the plant workers took in turbot.

When the plant first opened it took three shifts to handle the catch. Former plant manager, Junior Andersen, said, "We only had two small blast freezers, so it was slow getting it frozen." And that was the reason for having workers tending to the fish round the clock.

2023 was a far cry from the opening years. There's only one day shift. Workers are hard to find due to an aging workforce; greater opportunities for other employment for young people; plus, lack of accommodation to bring in people from out-of-town. Therefore, the fish plant had a shorter season of work for its employees.

But plant workers have fond memories of their days working together. Especially memorable are the years in the 1980s when there would be sometimes forty long liners from Newfoundland fishing out of Makkovik. It not only meant good hours of work, but new friendships were formed which have lasted ever since. You often hear Captain Wilf Bartlett, formerly of Triton, reminiscing about the fine summers he spent in Makkovik.

Constructed in 1915, the White Elephant Museum was once part of the Moravian Mission station which was established in Makkovik in 1896. Interestingly, the museum's unusual name is derived from the fact that at one point in its history, the



building required regular maintenance but had no real function. It became referred to as the "White Elephant" and the name has stuck to this day.

The White Elephant Museum was designated a Registered Heritage Structure in 2000, by the Heritage Foundation of Newfoundland and Labrador. Makkovik is on the north coast of Labrador, accessible by Air Borealis twin otters year round, and by the ferry Kamutik W in summer.

## **Cover Story: Our Lady of Mercy Heritage Church & Complex**

Our Lady of Mercy Heritage Church is the largest wooden structure in the province of Newfoundland and Labrador, standing 115 feet (35 meters) tall. Although the monumental church is the highlight of Our Lady of Mercy Complex, it is just one of many things to see and do at the site.

At the complex, there are three buildings. The church, the Event Hall (a converted gymnasium), and the museum (a converted rectory). Throughout the season, Our Lady of Mercy Complex Committee hosted several annual events at the Event Hall, including the Grand Ole Port au Port Opry in June and the Quilt Show & Dessert Tea in August. It has also been the home of the Annual Port au Port Agricultural & Craft Fall Fair for the last 48 years.

Our Lady of Mercy Museum houses the museum, Gift Shoppe, and Tea Room. This unique shared space creates a folky atmosphere. This year, the Tea Room menu was expanded to include light lunch items such as sandwiches and soup, in addition to the regular desserts and sweets. Tea Room patrons could enjoy their meal among locally made treasures, in the warmth of the sunroom, or take it out to the benches in the garden.

There are various experiences to be had in the church. Most days during July and August, talented musicians from the Port au Port Peninsula and surrounding region performed from 2-3pm for Music in the Church. The tall wooden ceilings and unique craftsmanship of the church make for wonderful acoustics. Over 20 local singers and songwriters and a gospel choir performed traditional, folk, country, and other genres of music in 2023.

Another way to experience the church is by joining a Miracles & Mysteries Tour. During this 90-minute tour, hear decades old stories of unexplained phenomena and averted disasters brought to life by a local guide. Discover the power of roses to create miracles and the faith of a rural mining and fishing community. After the tour, enjoy tea and a homemade dessert in the Tea Room.

Our Lady of Mercy Complex Committee revamped OurLadyOfMercyNL.com to include an events calendar and descriptions of the tours and offers available at the complex. Although the complex closed for the season on September 26, there are still a few upcoming events this year, including the Annual Christmas Concert in the Event Hall.

At almost 100 years old, Our Lady of Mercy Heritage Church is due for various upkeep projects, two of which are underway. The first, revitalizing the building with repairs and paint is made possible through a \$102,682 grant from the Department of Immigration, Population Growth, and Skills. Thanks to this grant the committee hired five employees for twenty-four weeks and provided training for those employees to safely complete the work. Materials were also purchased for the restoration. Second, is a \$40,000 project that entails replacing the eaves and trim work supported by a \$20,000 Revitalization Grant from Heritage NL.

Additionally, the complex is a source of community pride and spirit. Decades ago, locals volunteered to construct the church. Today they still give countless hours of volunteer time either through hosting events, fundraisers, donations, and more.

The committee is looking forward to opening mid-May 2024 and welcomes all to visit for Our Lady of Mercy Heritage Church's 99th year. Groups, bus tours, families, and individuals are all welcome.

MANL members The Rooms and Twillingate Museum are just two of the many museums from all across the country that have actively participated with clues over the years.

In 2024, the Canadian Museum Crossword will celebrate its fifth anniversary. Will your institution be next on the list for Canadians to discover?



The first crossword, launched during the pandemic summer of 2020, drew its inspiration from a series of museum crosswords organized by the Akron Art Museum in Ohio. The idea was to collaborate with other museums on a Canadian-focused crossword in a time of isolation to introduce crossword fans to the rich culture and history preserved by museums all across Canada.

The inaugural crossword brought together 40 institutions from eight provinces. In 2023, a total of 69 clues were submitted from 47 institutions representing all 10 provinces and one territory. Of those 47 institutions, 19 were first-time participants.

Each year, the crossword reaches some 125,000 people through social media posts from the Museum of History and the War Museum. There are also many more impressions on social media posts shared by the other participating museums. The crossword's web page receives an annual average of 2,500 hits, with an average time spent on the page of about eight minutes.

The Canadian Museum Crossword is a great opportunity for heritage institutions of all sizes to expand their audience and create a nationwide spotlight on new projects being developed.

## **Government of Canada Survey of Heritage Institutions: 2021**

## Canada

In July 2023, the Department of Canadian Heritage announced the release of the 2021 report on the Government of Canada Survey of Heritage Institutions (GCSHI), which collected financial and operating information for the 2020 data year on not-for-profit heritage institutions, including museums, art galleries, archives, historic sites, zoos and botanical gardens. The 2021 survey recorded the initial effects of the COVID-19 pandemic and the associated public health measures which forced the temporary closure of heritage organizations across the country.

The survey is conducted to provide aggregate data to all levels of government, heritage stakeholders and the public, in order to gain a better understanding of not-for-profit heritage institutions and to aid in the development of national and provincial/territorial policies and programs. The results from this sample survey are extrapolated to provide national and provincial/territorial estimates for the approximately 2700 not-for-profit heritage institutions across the country.

Highlights from the survey include...

o 87% of all museums and other heritage institutions in Canada were temporarily forced to close their doors due to COVID-19 public health measures in 2020. On average, heritage institutions reported having to remain closed for approximately 5 months.

o Temporary closures and social distancing restrictions during 2020 meant that heritage institutions saw fewer visitors come through their doors. There were only 16.9 million visits in 2020, a substantial decrease of nearly 79% from the 79 million visits in 2017.
